STATE OF NEVADA 1 EMPLOYEE-MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE 2 MEETING TRANSCRIPT 3 JANUARY 20, 2022 4 5 Right now, 14:40 people. Hi, sweet. 6 PARKER: 7 Thanks. Love that. Free delivery Sunday, January 23rd. Okay. Hi, I'm Michelle. 8 MICHELLE: 9 EVANS: Hi, Michelle. I'm Lisa Evans. I'm the new DAG for meetings. We're recording. 10 11 EVANS: Oh, did you call the meeting to order? 12 PARKER: I'm trying to, sorry. Yes. All right. It is Thursday, January 20, 2022. And I'm calling this 13 meeting to order the, uh, employee management committee. 14 Uh, there are two locations, or it's 9:15, sorry, 9:15 a.m. 15 There 16 are two locations in the Nevada State Library and Archives in Carson City and Grant Sawyer building in Las Vegas. This is 17 18 an in-person meeting, and we'll comply with the Governor's mandate of social distancing and mask wearing for all 19 20 individuals, whether or vaccinated or not vaccinated masks must be, uh, worn properly to cover the nose and mouth at all 21 22 times. The sites are connected by video conference, uh, using 23 teams, I guess, I don't know. Microphones and cameras here in Carson City are located in front of us. So, everybody will 24 25 talk towards the front, um, towards the audience. And in Las

Vegas, you guys point out where people have to talk. 1 Can you repeat that? Chair? DAVIES: 2 PARKER: Can you give -- can you give, uh, 3 testimony, um, instructions as far as where that your camera 4 5 is and your microphones? Yes, ma'am. Uh, the microphones were in 6 DAVIES: 7 the ceiling. The new microphones, I'm assuming is that red Do in the wall next to the camera. Uh, and, uh, please aim your 8 9 vocal projections towards the microphone as this will be transcribed from the audio recording. Thank you. 10 11 PARKER: Thank you. Evacuations in Northern Nevada, everybody will follow breeze out to the -- the foyer, 12 13 and then we'll either go across the street, across, uh, Stewart or into the main courtyard, um, depending on what the 14 15 situation is in Las Vegas. Can you give evacuation instructions briefly? 16

17 DAVIES: Evacuation instructions. Then we will 18 proceed out to the hallway. We'll head out to the east end of 19 the building and, uh, we'll issue Dr. S'mores.

20 PARKER: Awesome. All righty. Um, let's see. 21 Okay, at this time I'm gonna go ahead and call for public 22 comment. Uh, no -- no vote or action may be taken upon a 23 matter raised during public comment until the matter itself 24 has been specifically included on an agenda as an item upon 25 which action may be taken. Comments will be limited to five

1 minutes per person, and persons making comment will be asked 2 to begin by stating their name for the record. Do we have any 3 public comment in Las Vegas?

4DAVIES:Nobody here to present public comment.5Ms. -- Ms. Johnson no com -- no public comment at this time,6ma'am.

7 PARKER: Okay. Thank you. And in, uh, Northern
8 Nevada, is there any public comment? Seeing none, we'll move
9 on the agenda. Um, uh -- uh, number -- we're gonna move on to
10 committee introductions and meeting overview and updates. So,
11 um, we'll start in Las Vegas. If you guys wanna go ahead and
12 introduce yourselves.

WEISS: Todd Weiss, Deputy Attorney General.
DAVIES: Gwyn Davis, uh, department of Motor
Vehicles.

16 WRIGH: Ivory Wright. EMC Clerk.

Okay. And in Northern Nevada, um, we 17 PARKER: 18 wanna welcome Lisa Evans, our new, um, Deputy Attorney General in Northern Nevada. We wanna also thank, uh, uh, Nora and 19 20 Brice for continuing to -- to support us through all the transitions, um, and technical difficulties and things like 21 that. Uh, let's see. As y'all know, Maddie moved to a new 22 23 job. So, um, we still have Susan, right? EDGAR: 24 Yes.

25 PARKER: Okay. So, um, we also wanted to welcome,

she is not here today, but Susan Edgar as the new EMC 1 coordinator, and hopefully we'll meet her at the next meeting. 2 So, um, we'll go to the North. 3 Jennifer Bauer State Public Charter School 4 BAUER: 5 Authority. 6 Michelle Merrill, bureau of Vocational MERILL: 7 Rehabilitation. Stephanie Parker. Um, UNR. 8 PARKER: 9 EVANS: Uh, Lisa Evans Depart -- um, Deputy Attorney General, the Attorney General's office. 10 11 FLORES: Reece Flores, uh, sitting here for EMC coordinator. 12 13 PARKER: Awesome. Thank you. Thank you. 14 FLORES: We'll move on to, uh, number four, item 15 PARKER: number four, adoption of the agenda. Do I have a motion to --16 Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. 17 BAUER: 18 PARKER: Yes. 19 BAUER: I move to adopt. 20 All right, we have a motion. Do we have a PARKER: second? 21 I have a second. 22 MERRILL: 23 DAVIES: Mr. Gwyn, I'll second. Uh, Michelle. Michelle beats you. Okay, 24 PARKER: 25 so we have a second. Um, any discussion? All those in favor?

MULTIPLE: Aye. 1 And any opposed? So moved. Uh, item 2 PARKER: number five, uh, approval of minutes from June 25th. 3 Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. 4 BAUER: 5 PARKER: Yes. I move to adopt or approve. 6 BAUER: 7 Okay. We've got motion. Uh, second. PARKER: I will second. 8 MERRILL: 9 DAVIES: Ms. Gwyn, I'll second. There's a delay I tried to keep. I know. 10 PARKER: 11 Okay. Uh -- uh -- uh, any discussion? Go ahead. I'm sorry. Do we need to go through these 12 DAVIES: individually or can we motion to accept all minutes. All 13 previous minutes in one go. 14 15 Yeah, I'll entertain that. So --PARKER: Friendly amendment? 16 DAVIES: Yeah. Huh? We have motion to approve. 17 PARKER: 18 Um, June 25, 2020. August 6, 2020. September 3, 2020, and October 15th, 2020. Uh, all-inclusive minutes by Gwyn Davies. 19 20 BAUER: Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. I will second. 21 22 Awesome. Any discussion? All those in PARKER: 23 favor? 24 MULTIPLE: Aye. 25 PARKER: Any opposed? So moved. We're gonna move 5

on to item number nine. Uh, this is regarding grievance, 1 8002, Jared Stewart. And so, this is for to, uh, to consider 2 to determine if the grievance can be answered without a 3 hearing, if the matter is based upon an EMC's previous 4 5 decision or does not fall within the EMC's jurisdiction. Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. 6 BAUER: 7 PARKER: Yes. I feel like this grievance is 8 BAUER: 9 substantially similar to the ones we have heard before and decided not to move to a hearing and answer without a hearing 10 11 as a committee. I don't see anything in this one, um, that makes the substance of the grievance any different. 12 Okay. Anybody else? 13 PARKER: I agree. 14 MERRILL: Michelle, you said you agree? 15 PARKER: MERRILL: I agree. 16 17 PARKER: Gwyn. 18 DAVIES: Uh, I really thought this guy had nailed it on the head and then he sank it when he went back to the 19 20 vaccines thing. If he, if he'd stuck to the argument that, uh, that it was none for differentiation between employees, 21 22 uh, I would've been willing to hear it. But then his recomme 23 -- his proposed resolution is to allow staff to choose whether to get vaccinated or not. That's a -- that's a directive by 24 25 the Governor's office, a mandate, whatever our word is

nowadays. So, I don't feel that, uh, there's anything press 1 here. We've already heard it. 2 All right. I agree -- I agree. 3 PARKER: I don't -- yeah, just like, um, uh, some very, extremely similar or if 4 5 not, almost, um, definitely, um, the same as some previous ones. We don't have the authority. So --6 7 Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. BAUER: 8 PARKER: Yes. 9 BAUER: I'd like to make a motion. Yes, Jennifer. 10 PARKER: 11 BAUER: I move that we answer grievance number 8002 without a hearing based on the EMC's previous decisions 12 and the fact that EMC lacks jurisdiction to supersede a 13 Governor's directive. 14 15 So, we have a motion. PARKER: 16 DAVIES: I will second that. This is Gwyn. The -- the motion is second. Any 17 PARKER: 18 discussion? All those in favor? 19 MULTIPLE: Aye. 20 PARKER: Any opposed? 21 DAVIES: Aye. 22 So moved. Okay. Next one is ha, uh, PARKER: 23 number 10. Uh, greeting number 8050. Christopher Howland. Madam Chair? 24 MERRILL: 25 PARKER: Yes.

1 MERRILL: Michelle. Um, in reading this one, it appears to be similar to the one in -- in substance to the one 2 that we just reviewed, where this does not appear to be within 3 our jurisdiction to say that the proposed resolution sought by 4 5 the, the grievance of removing the mandatory testing and face coverings is not something we can grant. 6 7 All right. Is that a motion? PARKER: I would move that we do not have a 8 MERRILL: 9 jurisdiction to hear this. So -- okay. Mo -- your motion is not to 10 PARKER: 11 hear it? 12 MERRILL: Yes. Based on the previous. 13 PARKER: Based on the previous. 14 MERRILL: Okay. We have a motion. Oh --15 PARKER: 16 BAUER: Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. 17 PARKER: Yes. 18 BAUER: May I offer a friendly amendment? Yep, please do. 19 PARKER: 20 Just for consistency sake, for Brice and BAUER: Nora, um, usually the decision for similar grievances of this 21 22 nature is to decide to answer without a hearing based on the 23 EMC's previous decisions and the fact that EMC lacks authority to supersede a Governor's directive. 24 25 PARKER: Thank you. That's what he said.

MERRILL: That's what I said. 1 Thank you. That's what Michelle said. PARKER: 2 And so --3 MERRILL: Do you accept that for confirm? 4 PARKER: 5 BAUER: I do accept that from the amendment. Okay. So we got, uh, an amended motion. 6 PARKER: 7 Do we have a second? Ms. Chair, Jennifer, I second. 8 BAUER: 9 PARKER: And any discussion? All those in favor? 10 MULTIPLE: Aye. 11 PARKER: Any opposed? So moved. Okay, we're gonna move on to number 11. Grievance 8232. Jennifer Johnson. 12 Yeah. So what I write in is that the -- the -- the first 13 three items were resolved already. The first three lines made 14 15 resolved, and this is I think like the other ones where we 16 lack jurisdiction for this -- the outstanding --Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. 17 BAUER: PARKER: 18 -- issue. Yes. Could you, uh, sound up a little louder 19 DAVIES: 20 please? 21 So, oh, sorry. I -- I was --PARKER: 22 DAVIES: Maybe I'll walk there over here. 23 PARKER: All righty. Sorry, I was looking down too. So I was just saying that, um, and reading through this 24 25 one, it looked, looks like, uh, there were like four issues.

Three of them have been resolved. One of them is similar, 1 very extremely similar to the other ones. And so, um, the 2 first three look like they've been resolved. 3 4 DAVIES: I, um --5 BAUER: Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. PARKER: 6 Yes. So on this one I felt like it was slightly 7 BAUER: 8 different. Um, in that, yes, I found that some of the 9 concerns were resolved, but also, um, I -- I had to review very closely back and forth in the responses because at first 10 11 my concern was that, um, the grievance was not being allowed 12 to use admin leave or telework consistently. Not in violation 13 of regulation, but consistently applied policies in the agency. Right? Um, specifically she's indicating that she 14 15 just wanted to telework and, um, she was allowed and then she 16 was denied for the second time. And so I'm like, I'm confused. It seems inconsistent, but I believe, and I 17 18 deferred to my committee members on this, I believe that the agency clarified the second time the grievance wasn't allowed 19 20 to telework because that memo from the Department of Administration had come out. And so that changed the 21 circumstances. So the reason I feel this grievance is 22 23 slightly different is, um, there are similar concerns, but also because of the telework application, I believe that, um, 24 25 we still don't have jurisdiction to hear this grievance

because we, um, cannot over or supersede arrest 284.020 1 subsection two agencies have the ability to run their affairs 2 as they see fit. Um, so I don't -- I don't think we can 3 resolve the grievance issues, um, in -- in terms of the ones 4 5 that were not resolved over. Does that make sense? Kind of. But, so what was that? 6 PARKER: NRS 7 what? 284.020 Subsection two. It's basically 8 BAUER: 9 the statute that says nothing within the State Personnel Act, um, shall preclude an agency to run its affairs as it sees 10 11 fit. 12 PARKER: Okay. Anybody else? We're -- this doesn't read like one of 13 DAVIES: the, uh, millions that we've gone through before. Uh, 14 15 millions is a loop matter. 16 Okay. Say that again. PARKER: I -- I -- I just -- I'm just trying to 17 DAVIES: 18 sort this out in my head because I understand departments have the right to run their crews. Like they -- they're --19 20 they're, you know, departments have the right to manage and direct work agreed. But, uh, they also have to be consistent 21 22 with fair in it. 23 BAUER: Right. Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. Ι share the same concerns as Gwyn. Um, and when I first read 24 25 the grievance, that's exactly where my concerns were, is that

it appeared there could have been some inequities, um, alleged 1 in this grievance. But then the employer's responses at two 2 and three clarified that, um, the agreement was not allowed to 3 telework the second time because that memo had come out. 4 5 PARKER: The May 7th memo. BAUER: Correct. 6 7 PARKER: Okay. 8 BAUER: Is that what you guys see? 9 PARKER: I think it was actually a later memo. Ι think it was the --10 11 BAUER: Department of Admin memo. PARKER: Oh. 12 Um, that was in August. So I'm looking on 13 BAUER: page three under your response at -- at the top. Yeah. 14 Um, 15 okay. It was the May 7th memo that talked about COVID. So on 16 the step two response from the chief indicates on August 25th, I met with captains and majors and started the discussion 17 18 whether NPP should expand telework opportunities for quarantine periods involving asymptomatic employees. 19 Um, and 20 then further indicates, um, Northern Command provided 21 direction to their managers and supervisors on August 31st to 22 allow expend telework. 23 DAVIES: Jennifer Bauer. So -- so --24 PARKER: 25 DAVIES: Let, uh, can I read with you, what page

are you on? Cause I wanna catch up to you 'cause I wanna get 1 2 your point. Um, so I -- at the encouragement of DHRM 3 BAUER: staff brought my laptop so I can be more efficient. 4 I'm 5 looking at page 58 of the PDF, but I'm not sure that helps you in paper form. 6 7 DAVIES: Page what. I'm looking -- I'm looking at the -- the 8 BAUER: 9 memo from the office of the chief dated September 29th, which is the best day of the calendar. 10 11 PARKER: That isn't your birthday. BAUER: You got it. 12 All right. So, you know, what --13 PARKER: Does that help with Gwyn? Which --14 BAUER: From on what page was it? 15 DAVIES: BAUER: 16 Uh, at the bottom of page one of that memo from the chief on September 29, 2021 last paragraph. And then 17 18 it, um, continues onto, um, the top paragraph of page two. All right. 19 DAVIES: 20 PARKER: Oh. 21 DAVIES: So that paragraph over those two pages says that the chief encourages telework. Is that what we're 22 23 agreeing to? So what I'm looking -- looking --24 BAUER: Yes. 25 DAVIES: Okay.

BAUER: Oh, sorry, Ms. Chair. 1 PARKER: Go ahead. Yes, go ahead. 2 BAUER: Um, so what I'm looking at is that 3 occurred after, I believe double check with Gwyn that occurred 4 5 after she was denied the second instance of telework. Right. So this was in --6 DAVIES: 7 So she's asking for restoration of --BAUER: DAVIES: This began the September, this grievance 8 9 began in Octo -- Au -- August, right? So, yeah. Correct. 10 BAUER: 11 DAVIES: The memo came out afterwards. PARKER: So this is Stephanie. Um, so the -- the 12 13 pre -- prior memo to that encouraged telework from department of a admin from the Governor's office. Then this one -- then 14 this one states that yeah, they reconsidered, but it's after 15 the second request to telework that she was denied. 16 Correct. Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. 17 BAUER: 18 That's my interpretation is that, um, from reading the material, it seemed to me she was denied telework the second 19 20 time because she was COVID positive, although, um, asymptomatic, she was COVID positive and unvaccinated. 21 So in 22 accordance with the department of admin memo, she was placed 23 on sick leave rather than admin leave and denied telework. Is that what everybody else interpreted from the contents of this 24 25 packet?

1 DAVIES: That -- that was an -- this is, oh, I'm getting confused here. Sorry. 2 PARKER: Go ahead, Gwyn. 3 DAVIES: This is the second event. I -- I know I 4 5 said August because I read August off the grievance, but the second event was in October. No. Okay. When was the second 6 7 event? What do you mean? Because I was sorry, 8 JOHNSON: 9 Jennifer, Johnson on the grievance. Um, I was positive in August. 10 11 PARKER: Uh, wait a minute, I'm sorry. No -- no --12 no. That's testimony, right? 13 DAVIES: BAUER: Okay. 14 Yeah, that's testimony. And this is only 15 PARKER: for EMC committee members should determine whether or not 16 we're gonna push it to a hearing. 17 18 BAUER: Correct. Okay. Sorry. So on this one, I, yeah, I don't wanna get 19 PARKER: 20 into deliberating on who's right or who's wrong or -- or anything like that. 'Cause the only thing we're saying is it, 21 22 does it need to go to a hearing? I think it needs to go to a 23 hearing just 'cause I think we need more clarification. So 24 far --25 DAVIES: I agree with you. I think it needs proper

1 deliberation. I agree with you.

2 PARKER: And that was planned for the record.
3 Michelle.

MERRILL: I'm struggling with in the -- the -- this
-- the remedy that the women's seeking agreement's seeking is
partly because they see themselves as an individual with a
disability and feel that this would be a reasonable
accommodation. And --

9 PARKER: But we can't hear the accommodation part. 10 That's not what we're --

11MERRILL:Right. And --12PARKER:Teleworking is.

MERRILL: And if that was the foundation, there needs to be discussion about what disability is. So I think this should perhaps be heard because there's too many other factors. You know, without going into the meat of it today, obviously that's to me.

PARKER: Yeah. And I don't wanna, I -- and -- and I agree with you, it's not whether or not we can make a determination about an accommodation, whatever they call it, waiver or whatever.

MERRILL: Reasonable accommodation.
PARKER: Reasonable accommodation for specifically
for COVID. 'Cause we don't make that determination in this
venue. But I think we do need to hear this to -- to more clar

1 -- get more clarity so that we can actually give a better
2 judgment. Yeah.

BAUER: Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer.

PARKER: Yes, Jennifer.

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5 BAUER: Um, uh, I'm not sure that we can offer remedy to the grievance when we do hear this. Um, and it 6 sounds like the committee's leaning in that direction. So, I 7 will support the committee for this instance because there is 8 9 lack of clarity. Um, again, I will restate, I'm not sure what remedy we can offer the grievance, however, it will afford the 10 11 grievance and opportunity to get some answers possibly. Um, and it will possibly afford the grievance to, um, be referred 12 to an appropriate venue for the determination of a disability 13 and, um, the request of an accommodate -- a reasonable 14 15 accommodation that does not belong in the EMC. So, um, I'm not a fan of hearing grievances 'cause of all the work that 16 goes into them if we can't provide a remedy. But, um, we also 17 18 do exist to provide a venue for grievance and, um, a forum for them to, um, air their concerns. So, I think in this case, I 19 20 will support my committee members.

21MERRILL:Actually, may I ask one more question?22PARKER:Absolutely.

23 MERRILL: This body does not have the authority to 24 be in state lead, correct?

25 PARKER: Uh, we have in the past.

1 MERRILL: Oh, okay. We do, we have been able, yeah. 2 PARKER: It, it 3 depends on the circumstances, so yeah. MERRILL: Right. Then I -- I agree with Jennifer 4 5 Bauer. 6 BAUER: Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. 7 Yes, Jennifer. PARKER: I move that we move grievance number 8232 8 BAUER: 9 to a hearing. 10 PARKER: Okay. We've got a motion. We have a 11 second. I will second that motion, Mr. Gwyn. 12 DAVIES: All right. And any discussion? All those 13 PARKER: 14 in favor? 15 Aye. MULTIPLE: Any opposed? So moved. Uh, move on to 16 PARKER: number 12. This is grievance 8274. Joshua Farrow. 17 Ma'am. 18 DAVIES: PARKER: Yes. 19 Madam Chair. Uh, respectfully, I -- I 20 DAVIES: 21 know that I've got, uh, we all have sinus issues and sniffle issues. We got cold, but just not hearing the volume from 22 23 your end. 24 PARKER: Okay. 25 DAVIES: So, it's a max on the thing here. 18

1 PARKER: Loud. And if you guys can talk that way, chop up and towards that way is the microphone. Is this 2 better? 3 If you get yourself a Marshall Amp and 4 DAVIES: 5 play a Hendrix solo and then I'll be okay. 6 I won't sing anything. Okay. We'll --PARKER: 7 we'll project better. Sorry. Thank you. I -- I apologize. Thank you. 8 DAVIES: 9 PARKER: Okay, so --We're gonna move I Todd, the other man in 10 DAVIES: 11 the room and it's a mail issue, probably. 12 PARKER: Oh, okay. So, we're gonna move to grievance 8274 Joshua Farrow. 13 Good to go if you --14 DAVIES: Okay. Michelle -- Michelle. 15 PARKER: 16 Sorry. Um, thank you Madam Chair. MERRILL: Um, upon reading this one, it does not appear to me that we have 17 18 the jurisdiction as a body to grant the proposed resolution of a medical and religious exemption that would seem out of our 19 20 jurisdiction. 21 PARKER: Absolutely. So, I would move that we, um, words do not 22 MERRILL: 23 hear this because this is outside of our jurisdiction. EMC Lacks jurisdiction. 24 PARKER: 25 MERRILL: Yes.

PARKER: And we have a motion. Do we have a 1 second? 2 Ms. Chair. This is Jennifer. BAUER: I second. 3 Any discussion? 4 PARKER: 5 DAVIES: None from me. All those in favor? MULTIPLE: 6 Aye. 7 DAVIES: Any opposed? Obviously. Um, so moved. Gonna move on to item number 13. Uh, grievance number 8364. 8 9 James Andrews. Ms. Chair, this is Jennifer. 10 BAUER: 11 PARKER: Yes, Jennifer. I sympathize with this agreement 'cause BAUER: 12 I've never worked four tens, but I think it would be nice, and 13 I can imagine if someone works four tens and gets used to that 14 schedule and it bases, uh, a work life, home life balance on 15 16 that, and then it's removed for, um, apparent lack of communication and or apparent inequities, then that does seem 17 18 unfair. However, agency have to do it. The agency has policy. The agency is allowed to change an employee's work 19 20 shift based on business needs. So, whether it is fair or not, whether the employee likes it or not, I think our duty here, 21 um, is to decide based on what the agency is allowed to do 22 23 pursuant to law writing policy. And I do think this is one of the situations where we can't help the agreement because the 24 25 agency can run its affairs.

1	PARKER:	And Stephanie Parker for the record, I'm				
2	just I'm gonna a	agree with my, uh, fellow committee

4	However, it doesn't	sound like it was singling anybody out or
